

Correct definition: To remedy or counteract (a defect, for example).

to scold or punish in order to improve: Don't correct your child in public. to work against the effect of (something undesirable): Her contact lenses correct her poor eyesight.

When something is true, legitimate or right, you can say it's correct, using the word as an adjective. It can also be a verb; to correct wrong answers is to adjust them to make them right.

To destroy or frustrate; remove or counteract the operation or effects of, especially of something that is undesirable or injurious; rectify: as, to correct abuses; to correct the acidity of the stomach by alkaline ...

CORRECT definition: to set or make true, accurate, or right; remove the errors or faults from: The new glasses corrected his eyesight. See examples of correct used in a sentence.

These verbs mean to make right what is wrong. Correct refers to eliminating faults, errors, or defects: I corrected the spelling mistakes. The new design corrected the flaws in the earlier version.

If something is correct, it is in accordance with the facts and has no mistakes.
